
Thank you, Lord ...

In the Fall of 1863 President Lincoln initiated the annual observance of the holiday we call Thanksgiving. It was a time when the harvest was not plentiful, when peace seemed distant. The Civil War alerted America to the fragile nature of everyday blessings.

In the midst of the turmoil and bloodshed, Lincoln called for a National Day of Prayer and thanksgiving. Though the hour was dark, Americans could still be called back to the simple faith of their childhood. But it was not until eight decades later, in the fall of 1943, that President Franklin Roosevelt proclaimed Thanksgiving to a waiting America. This time the people were unified, backing their sons and daughters on another war front. On that day millions prayed for an end to the tyrannies of Nazi Germany and Imperial Japan.

We as a country have a long history of acknowledging the One who is the giver of all good things. At the very beginning of our country, the Declaration of Independence appealed to the Creator to justify our existence as a nation. We Christians know that our Creator is also our Redeemer and Sanctifier, and He is the One who deserves our praise and thanks today: the triune God – the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. 

C: Amen.


P: Do you believe that my forgiveness is God's forgiveness? **C: Yes.**



A Statement on Holy Communion

We rejoice in the celebration of the LORD'S Supper as the Lord Jesus comes to us in a very personal manner, giving to us His true Body and Blood in, with, and under the bread and wine in this sacred meal. St. Paul writes, "A man ought to examine himself before he eats of the bread and drinks of the cup. For anyone who eats and drinks without recognizing the body of the Lord eats and drinks judgment on himself." (1 Corinthians 11:28-29) It is out of love and care for every individual that comes to the Lord's Supper that we ask those who are not instructed in the faith and/or doubt the presence of the Body and Blood of Jesus in this Sacrament to speak to the Pastor before attending the Lord's Supper. Members of Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod congregations who:

- Repent of their sin;
- Believe in Jesus as their Savior;
- Trust that they are receiving, not only bread and wine, but also the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ in the Lord's Supper; and
- Intend, with the help of the Holy Spirit, to live as forgiven sinners resisting the devil, saying no to sinful desires, and walking in the newness of life ...
