








The Salutation and Prayer of the Day

The Gospel Lesson: Luke 17:1-10

The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke, the seventeenth chapter.



¹[Jesus] said to his disciples, "Temptations to sin are sure to come, but woe to the one through whom they come! ²It would be better for him if a millstone were hung around his neck and he were cast into the sea than that he should cause one of these little ones to sin. ³Pay attention to vourselves! Please read these words from Jim Sprague (Executive Director of the Pregnancy Resource Center in Grand Rapids) about Proposal 3.

Dear Friends,

The Michigan Supreme Court has determined that Proposal 3 will be on the November 8 ballot. This means that Michigan voters will decide whether or not to modify the state's constitution to enshrine abortion therein. However, the language crafted to accomplish this goes FAR beyond simply "restoring Roe," as its proponents have said.

Make no mistake, if Proposal 3 is approved Michigan will become more extreme on abortion than California and New York.

In addition to making abortion legal, this action would at the same time strike down all of the current laws related to abortion. This is incredibly dangerous and far-reaching! Gone would be both parental consent and the current 24-hour waiting period; also erased is a screening for coercion (currently, the abortionist is required by law to discern whether or not someone is forcing the abortion against the woman's will). **So extreme!**

Human traffickers and those running prostitution rings would greatly benefit from this change, so would any man that commits statutory rape. If a pregnancy occurs in any of these situations, this "problem" could be resolved by simply forcing the women involved to have an abortion, all with no questions asked.

Furthermore, this opens the door for minors to receive an immediate and private abortion, that is without her parent's knowledge and consent. Keep in mind, this same minor could <u>not</u> get a tattoo without her parent's approval, nor could she get an aspirin from the school nurse.

Also stricken from the books would be a law requiring state inspections of abortion facilities. Veterinary clinics would be more closely monitored than abortion clinics. In addition, the vet could actually become an abortion provider, as well, because in the "new Michigan" abortions can be performed by <u>any medical</u> <u>person</u>. **So radical!**

I think Proposal 3 can be defeated at the ballot box—<u>IF</u> we get the word out on how extreme and radical it is. What's more, this is the first time in history that both prolife <u>and</u> pro-choice voters can agree on a piece of legislation that is dangerous to the women of Michigan, and should not be adopted.

Please join me in praying that this proposal is <u>not</u> approved by the voters.

Friends, <u>these are unprecedented times and we cannot remain</u> <u>silent in the coming months</u>. I urge you to consider speaking out against this dangerous proposition. Maybe you're like me and political conversations make you uncomfortable. But we must understand that if our constitution is modified in the way being proposed, we will not recognize the state of Michigan when the dust from this election settles.

We must all get over, around or through our hesitancy in talking about the dangers of Proposal 3, and I'm right there with you!
