From Pastor Schaeffer:

Friends in Christ: some people say we waste our time coming to worship and studying the Bible. Bill Gates, for example, said, "Just in terms of allocation of time resource, religion is not very efficient. There's a lot more I could do on a Sunday morning." (CPR, Vol. 10, Part 4, p. 26)

We who have walked with our living Lord and who have had our minds and eyes opened by the Spirit of the Lord know better, don't we? We know there are few better



ways to spend our time than sitting at our Savior's feet and listening to His teachings ... to be nurtured in our faith ... instructed in the ways of the Lord. As Paul says to Timothy, "But as for you, continue in what you have learned and have become convinced of, because you know those from whom you learned it, and how from infancy you have known the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching,

rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work." (2 Timothy 3:14-16) Martin Luther said, "Among all the gifts the gift of the Word of God is the most valuable. For if you take this away, it is like taking the sun away from the earth."

It is my prayer that you will do what Jesus' disciples always do: that you will not only study God's Word but that you will share His Word with others! The women told of Jesus' resurrection. Peter and John reported to the disciples that the tomb was empty. The two Emmaus disciples recounted their encounter with the living Lord. The disciples described to Thomas Jesus' sudden appearing. The disciples announced the resurrection of Jesus in various tongues on Pentecost. Philip explained to the Ethiopian eunuch how Jesus fulfilled Isaiah 53. Stephen preached to the angry crowd. Peter narrated the gospel to Cornelius and his family. Paul defended the faith before Stoic and Epicurean philosophers. ... The history of the mission of the Christian church is one of Jesus' disciples making other disciples who make other disciples. There is an old German proverb that says, "That which fills the heart overflows from the lips."

To whom is Jesus sending you so that you might be His witness? A family member? A friend at school? A co-worker? A golfing buddy? You may think, "Jesus surely can't use me." Oh yes, He can! You are instrumental to His plan. He places you in people's lives and opens your mouth to speak His powerful, lifecreating Word!



Easter and Its Season



Easter is a victory celebration, a time for all Christians to proclaim boldly their faith in a risen and victorious Savior. For the early Christians, Easter was not merely one day, it was, and is, a whole season that that also includes the celebration of Jesus' ascension. The fifty days between Easter and Pentecost, known as the Great Fifty Days, was the first liturgical season observed in the first three centuries of the Church. This fifty-day celebration is a week of weeks, renewed in the last decades by emphasizing the Sundays as being "of Easter." The season's length is fitting because we are dedicating one seventh of the year to the Lord's resurrection.

Easter is the richest and most lavishly celebrated festival of the Church Year. Congregations may hold a sunrise service, commemorating the surprise of the women visiting the empty tomb of Christ, as well as services that celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Forty days after Easter (Acts 1;3) the Church celebrates the Ascension of Our Lord, who ascended into heaven not only as God but also as man. The final Sunday of the Easter season, celebrated as Pentecost, was adopted by Christians to commemorate the first great harvest of believers for Christ (Acts 2:1-41) Thus, Pentecost is often referred to as the "birthday" of the Christian church, as the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples and they gave their compelling witness about the resurrected Lord. Pentecost is a day of joy in the gifts of the Spirit as He still reaches into our lives, just as He did to the crowds on the first Pentecost: through the preaching of God's Word and Holy Baptism.



Starting April 8th, Monday evening services will become Monday AFTERNOON services.



The Monday evening service will now be at 4:15 p.m. starting April 8 (on a trial basis). One of the primary reasons for this change is to avoid nighttime driving.

If you haven't attended a Monday service, they are like Sunday's service, although there are some notable differences:

- Holy Communion is served at every service (unless Pastor Schaeffer is away).
- The services are shorter in length of time, with Pastor preaching the same sermon he preached on Sunday.
- Hymns are sung acapella.
- The worshippers are fewer in number.
- We sit at the front of the sanctuary!

If you typically attend the worship service on Sunday, but miss it for some reason, please come out Monday afternoon!

Being Physically Active Can Make Up for Sitting

We've all heard about the health consequences of sitting for periods of time such as:

- Weakening your leg and gluteal muscles.
- Causing your hip flexor muscles to shorten, leading to hip problems.
- Increasing your risk of developing type 2 diabetes.
- Escalating your risk of suffering a heart attack and stroke.

The good news is that a little exercise can offset the damages of prolonged sitting. A study published in the *British Journal of Sports Medicine* showed that just 20-25 minutes a day of physical activity helped to offset a sedentary lifestyle.



The study involved 12,000 people (aged 50+ years) who wore movement detection

sensors for at least two years. The researchers found that those who sat for more than 12 hours a day had a 38% higher risk for an early death than those who sat for eight hours – but only if they also had less than the recommended 20-25 minutes a day of exercise. The more active a participant was, the more the risk declined.

The study was observational, so the data could not show cause and effect, but researchers concluded that even small amounts of physical activity may be an effective strategy to lessen the mortality risk due to being sedentary.
